## **DSS Family Day Care Transition Grant**

The South Dakota (SD) Department of Social Services (DSS) is now accepting applications from state unregulated and city licensed family day care providers that are currently working to become state registered.

This opportunity allows eligible day care providers to apply for up to \$15,000 in grant funding to purchase compliance-related items and enhancements for their program. Providers awarded this grant will also receive technical assistance, free marketing, free health and safety training, access to the SD Early Childhood Enrichment (ECE) Start Provider Portal to advertise, professional growth and credential opportunities, social emotional training, and more.
